North Country Farmers Advocate for Agriculture in Albany


Members from St. Lawrence County Farm Bureau recently spent time at the State Capitol meeting with lawmakers to advocate for public policy priorities that reinvest in our family farms and open up new markets for New York farm products. Members kicked off the two-day trip with New York Farm Bureau's annual Taste of New York reception, a popular event attended by elected officials and decision makers. Representatives spent a full day attending meetings with Senators and Members of the Assembly, not only with our own elected officials, but also with New York City legislators. They gave each lawmaker an honest assessment of the additional economic pressures family farms have been facing over the past two years, including low commodity and milk prices and rising labor costs. They discussed the need for a state investment in critical research, promotion, farm safety and educational programs, clean water infrastructure and the Environmental Protection Fund and legislation to offset the harmful effects of the minimum wage increase.

While in Albany, St. Lawrence County
Farm Bureau had the opportunity to
present a plaque to Senator Patty Ritchie,
Chair of the Senate Agriculture
Committee, on behalf of the farm families
of the 48th Senate District for standing up
for agriculture. Her hard work and
dedication were evident in the final state
budget passed shortly after the April 1
deadline. There is strong support for
agricultural programs, environmental
funding and the "Farm to Food Bank" tax

Agricultural Academy Accepting Enrollment for Next Year

The Agricultural Studies Academy at Cornell Cooperative Extension's Learning Farm is accepting enrollment



for the 2017-2018 school year. The Academy is a partnership between Cornell Cooperative Extension and St. Lawrence-Lewis BOCES and offers a one year program to high school seniors who are interested in pursuing careers in agriculture or agribusiness. The Agricultural Academy offers an integrated curriculum and emphasizes: business management, plant and crop science, agricultural mechanics, animal and veterinary science, food production and processing, computer applications and environmental stewardship. In addition to receiving classroom instruction, the Academy's

location at Cooperative Extension's Learning Farm gives students the opportunity to receive hands-on field experience in livestock production and management, poultry production, hay production, rotational grazing, managing a sugar bush as well as seasonal vegetable and fruit production.

To enroll, high school students graduating in 2018 must be in good academic standing and have completed their regents requirements.
