#### You have an idea about how to improve agriculture:


- Talk with your fellow members

- Local resolutions become county Farm Bureau policy and are submitted to NYFB

Should New York Farm Bureau support legislation offering undocumented residents the ability to obtain a "standard" driver's license?

Should the quarterly employer payroll threshold for unemployment insurance for agricultural labor be increased from \$20,000? If so, what should it be increased to?

If New York State legalizes the recreational use of marijuana, how should New York farmers play a role, if any, in the regulatory process, production and distribution?

Should a milk support program be created similar to the Cotton Ginning Cost Share program?

# **Schumer Pushes for Change to Boost Cideries**

Senator Schumer recently visited DeFisher Fruit Farm's Rootstock Ciderworks in Williamson to advocate for a change to burdensome federal regulations that increase production costs for cideries. Currently, any cider that is above 6.9% alcohol content must be in wine-approved bottles or containers. Cideries want to be able to package their cider in 12-ounce cans to lower their production costs.
