AGRICULTURAL LITERACY WEEK Celebrated March 21-25, 2022



Agriculture is a unifying factor for communities all over. Whether you have 100 acres or a rooftop, there are opportunities for growing food and sharing the journey from soil to table with those around, as illustrated in *Farmer Will Allen and the Growing Table*. This book will take students on an explorative journey to learn

about community gardens and inspire them to build communities through food, even if they only have a pot on their porch to cultivate.

Will Allen is no ordinary farmer. A former basketball star, he's as tall as his truck, and he can hold a cabbage, or a basketball, in one hand. But what is most special about Farmer Will is that he can see what others can't see. When he looked at an abandoned city lot he saw a huge table, big enough to feed the whole world. No space, no problem. Poor soil, there's

a solution. Need help, found it. Farmer Will is a genius in solving problems. Jacqueline Briggs Martin tells the inspiring story of an innovator, educator, and community builder. Combined with artist Eric-Shabazz Larkin's striking artwork, readers will share Will Allen's optimism and determination to bring good food to every table. This story also showcases the unique diversity of agricultural operations that is especially applicable to New York's combination of rural, suburban, and urban landscapes.

FFA members Addie Clore of the Groton FFA and Abby Thomas of the TST BOCES FFA have been visiting classrooms all over the county reading the book and teaching all about worms and their importance in agriculture. They will be doing a session with the Lansing Recreation Departmentand Lansing Loves to Read. The Ithaca Farmers Market will also host them at a Saturday market for market-goers to learn all about worms.

2022 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

Below are the New York Farm Bureau 2022 Legislative Priorities. These priorities are a culmination of the grassroots efforts which began last fall at county annual meetings and culminated at the State Annual Meeting held in December. These priorities reflect the collective interest of our members and rural communities and will determine the focus of our advocacy discussion and action for the year ahead.

- Double the Agricultural Workforce Retention Tax Credit
- Establish a refundable investment tax credit for agriculture.
- Support critical funding for current agricultural animal health (such as the Avian Disease Program), promotion, research, and environmental programs in the final FY 22/23 state budget, including a \$500 million Environmental Protection Fund.
- Support legislation that adjusts New York's unemployment insurance employer contribution rate, which would allow New York to replenish the UI trust fund without overburdening businesses with high UI tax bills as they recover from the pandemic.
- Support legislation allowing direct to consumer shipping for all New York-produced farm beverages, including beer, cider, and distillates.
- Support farmers in their efforts to adapt to and mitigate climate change through funding of critical programs in the Environmental Protection Fund and legislative programs that support on-farm renewable energy.

- Support the development of solar energy that balances private property rights and current and future land needs of agriculture in the state. Whenever possible, prime soils and actively farmed lands should be avoided in favor of previously disturbed or fallow lands and rooftop development for distributed generation. Power should be generated more closely to where it is going to be used.
- Support investment in new meat, vegetable, fruit and seafood processing facilities in New York.
- Oppose legislation that prohibits the use of agricultural pesticides.
- Oppose Extended Producer Responsibility legislation that doesn't require consumer responsibility of packaging they receive.
- Ensure a common-sense resolution to DEC's water withdrawal regulatory actions for farms.
- Pursue legislation that would require utilities to maintain a minimum height of 20 feet for power lines and 18 feet for other lines over farm fields upon request of landowner or farmer who is leasing the land.

The Tompkins County Dairy Princess Program delivers boots-on-the-ground dairy promotion and outreach under three main themes:

- Dairy foods are an important part of a healthy diet
- Dairy farmers take good care of their cows
- Dairy farmers are excellent stewards of the environment

Dairy promotion in recent years has been different due to COVID-19; however, the young women in the program have continued to work diligently to promote nature's perfect drink. When promotion in person was not an option, they began making promotional videos to post online and share with schools, and as gatherings and events started opening again, these young women were eager to get back to in-person promotions. Soon they will be headed into elementary schools to read to classes outside their district for the first time in two years. These young women will continue to stand up for agriculture long after they leave the program, even if they do not end up with a career in agriculture – although many of them do.

We are thrilled to invite you to celebrate and thank the young women who've worked through the changing times to promote dairy in new ways. We hope you will join us at the annual **Dairy Promotion Banquet**, **Saturday**, **April 30 at the Dryden VFW. Milk punch at 6 p.m.**, **dinner to follow at 6:30 p.m.** Your attendance is very appreciated by the court and committee, and we can't wait to see your smiling faces again.

The banquet is not a fundraiser for the program, and the cost of the event exceeds the price of individual dinners. However, the generous donations of farmers and support service providers helps make up the difference and keep the program afloat. Please consider a donation, whether you can attend the banquet or not. As we begin a new era of the Tompkins County Dairy Promotion Program, we will rely on fundraising and donations more than ever before.

The Tompkins County Dairy Promotion Committee provides leadership for our county's Dairy Princess/Ambassador Program and invites youth and young adults (age 12 to 24) interested in promoting the dairy industry to join the program. The experience is fun, challenging, provides a wide range of public relations activities, and offers the chance to work as a team with a great group of youth and young adults. We often hear from past program participants that the Dairy Princess program helped them develop and sharpen skills that have contributed to their success as adults.
