I believe Farm Bureau's major purpose is to inform and educate governmental policy makers on how their actions, or in-actions, affect agriculture and rural life. The old adage "those who show up, make the rules" doesn't always apply to New York State. The urban centers of NYS are so great that only a portion

of their representatives need to attend to dominate government even if all the rural representatives show up. This is why it is so important for Farm Bureau members to go to Albany and Washington D.C. and lobby for our cause. I want to thank many on our county Farm Bureau Board of Directors for making time to go on these visits.

In the past, I've touched on Agriculture in the Classroom. This is a pilot program funded by Senator Akshar and administered by Broome County Cornell Cooperative Extension. Last year, five schools participated, this year there are ten. It's being so well received, that schools are investing their own funds to purchase equipment and to build structures such as greenhouses. This is a great program because students learn math and science by getting down in the dirt. Students understand concepts better by observing natural processes rather than trying to understand what a stale textbook states. New York's Department of Education and Cornell University are watching the program's success, with possible expansion across the state. It's exciting that this is happening right here and Broome County Farm Bureau is more than happy to help out in its success. Exposing children to agriculture in this way can only help our industry in the future.

After another very successful auction in 2017, we wrap up this year knowing that we have been able to help out a lot of folks either through scholarships, monetary donations to many causes, or old-fashioned hard work. It has been a challenging year, weather-wise and economically, but we will continue the fight to bring a safe, healthy, and relatively low-cost food supply to our communities.
